1. MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

Mayor Gonzalez called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

2. MOMENT OF SILENCE AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

After a Moment of Silence, Commissioner Alvarez led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. PROCLAMATIONS AND SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS

3.A Proclamation - National Day of Prayer 2023

The request is for the Commission to present a Proclamation to Randy Law, President of National Day of Prayer of Osceola County, Inc.

City Manager Steigerwald read a proclamation in honor of National Day of Prayer as the Mayor and Commissioners presented the proclamation to Ms. Randy Law.

Ms. Law thanked the Commission for recognizing National Day of Prayer and invited the public to functions being held throughout Osceola County on Thursday, May 4, 2023 from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. at Kissimmee City Hall, Osceola County Courthouse, and in St. Cloud at the Boat Basin on the Lakefront. Ms. Law read a statement and quoted George Washington.

3.B Proclamation - Foster Youth Connection Month 2023

The request is for the Commission to present a Proclamation to Pastor Rupert Henry, founder of Foster Youth Connection.

City Manager Steigerwald read a proclamation in honor of Foster Youth Connection as the Mayor and Commissioners presented the proclamation to Pastor Rupert Henry.

Pastor Henry thanked everyone for being present for the celebration of the National Day of Prayer and Foster Youth Connection Month. Foster Youth Connection is dedicated to Eileen Caldwell, Homer Caldwell, and former City Manager Mark Durbin. These individuals have been a great source of encouragement over the years. Mr. Caldwell passed away earlier this year and flowers were presented to the Pastor of Solid Rock Church in his honor. The widow of retired City Manager Mark Durbin was unable to attend; Pastor Henry presented flowers to Mayor Gonzalez in honor of Mark Durbin's

service to the community and he recognized Greenway Church for all their support.

Pastor Matt Quainoo, Solid Rock Church, was asked to comment on Mr. Caldwell, who was 94 years young was still working in the community until his passing.

City Manager Steigerwald recapped the history of former City Manager Mark Durbin, stating he was a great man who served as the longest tenured City Manager in the City History; he served from 1987 to 2010.

3.C Proclamation - Arab American Heritage Month

The request is for the City Commission to present a Proclamation to Neal Abid, Florida Chapter Lead at the Arab American Foundation.

City Manager Steigerwald read a proclamation in honor of Arab American Heritage Month as the Mayor and Commissioners presented the proclamation to Neal Abid and members of the Florida Chapter of the Arab American Foundation.

Mr. Abid thanked the Commission and the City and stated there is a large demographic of Arab Americans in our community.

3.D Swearing In of New Police Chief Betty Holland

The request is for the City Commission to welcome the new Police Chief for the City of Kissimmee, Chief Betty Holland.

Assistant City Manager Jeff O'Dell administered the Oath of Office to Chief Betty J. Holland.

Chief Holland thanked God and expressed appreciation to the Commission and City Manager for giving her the opportunity to serve. She thanked her family and friends for all their support and prayers over the years. Chief Holland addressed the members of the Police Department and promised to always do her best for every member of the department and our community. Chief Holland was joined by the City Commission in congratulations.

3.E Retirement of Fire Department Chaplain Peter Zieg

Staff requests recognition of retired Fire Department Chaplain Peter Zieg.

Fire Chief Jim Walls thanked Retired Police Chief Jeff O'Dell for his service and congratulated new Chief Betty Holland; he looks forward to continuing the partnership with the Police and Fire Departments.

Chief Walls commented on Pastor Pete Zieg who is retiring after 32 years of dedicated and caring service to the Kissimmee Fire Department and our citizens. Pastor Zieg is the son of a career firefighter who retired as a deputy fire chief. He built a successful business working with fire extinguishers and moved to Kissimmee in 1975 to become the Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church; he remained there until his retirement in 2004. Pastor Zieg's first interaction with the Fire Department was performing a wedding ceremony for fire employee, Mike O'Dowd, and later he was asked to work on the dedication of Station # 1 (now # 11) to Joseph Rinaldi. Twenty-two (22) years later he assisted with the dedication of Station # 13 for Larry Brown. Pastor "Pete" was with the Kissimmee Fire Department more than 33 years and during that time he performed many weddings, funerals, and

facility and equipment dedications. He has been an asset to the Kissimmee Fire Department and touched many lives.

Pastor Zieg spoke about his relationship with the City and stated it has been a wonderful ride and he has enjoyed serving in many capacities and was honored to be included in the Fire Department family.

Chief Walls presented Pastor Zieg with a retirement watch on behalf of the City of Kissimmee.

3.F Employee of the Month for May - Michael Kane

That the City Commission join the City Manager in recognizing Michael Kane, Fire Department, as May's Employee of the Month.

City Manager Steigerwald introduced Fire Engineer Michael Kane who has been with the City for eighteen (18) years. He is the Engineer for Station # 14 and also a Paramedic and Firefighter. Above and beyond that, he has taken the initiative to get all pre-plans for commercial businesses ready so when a fire crew arrives on scene, they are prepared with a plan of attack to fight a fire. This is above and beyond his job requirements and is a process that will benefit our citizens and the Fire Department.

City Manager Steigerwald mentioned that approximately fifteen (15) years ago, Michael was on light duty and was scheduled to work in Human Resources. He made an impression on all the staff in City Hall for being helpful and coming up with many ideas that have been implemented over the years. City Manager Steigerwald reminded everyone that the Employee of the Month is not selected by the Commission, City Manager, or department heads, they are nominated by their co-workers and selected by a committee of peers from all departments in the City and there is no greater honor.

Engineer Kane thanked those who nominated him and stated it is a privilege and honor to serve and he is humbled by the applause and recognition. He enjoys going out and speaking with our citizens and loves the Fire Department.

City Attorney Sanchez de Fuentes read Proposed Ordinance # 23-03 by title.

City Manager Steigerwald informed the Commission the requested changes are to update the Internal Revenue Code relating to pre-retirement death language, minimum distribution age, ability to use discretion when seeking to recover inadvertent over payments, and options for prepayment for prior military service. There is no financial impact to the plan as advised by the plan's actuary.

Mayor Gonzalez announced the Public Hearing with no response from the audience.

Commissioner Castano made a motion to approve the First Reading of Proposed Ordinance #23-03. Commissioner Eady seconded the motion.

Approval of the First Reading of the Proposed Ordinance # 23-04 for the General Employees Retirement Plan.

City Attorney Sanchez de Fuentes read Proposed Ordinance # 23-04 by title.

City Manager Steigerwald informed the Commission this proposed ordinance is similar to the previous agenda item and includes updates to the Internal Revenue Code on minimum distribution age, pre-retirement death language, discretion on collecting inadvertent overpayments, and allows for payment options for prior military service. The General Pension Actuary has determined there is no impact to the plan and as a result, staff recommends approval after holding the Public Hearing.

Mayor Gonzalez announced the Public Hearing with no response from the audience.

Commissioner Olga Castano made a motion to approve the Public Hearing. Commissioner Carlos Alvarez seconded the motion.

Requesting approval of minor amendments to Section 22-26 of the Noise Ordinance.

City Attorney Sanchez de Fuentes read Proposed Ordinance # 23-05 by title.

City Manager Steigerwald stated this is a First Reading for minor amendments for the Noise Ordinance originally passed in February of this year.

Planner Ashley Cornelison explained the minor modifications to Section 22-26 as the enforcement section of the Noise Ordinance. Removing Subsection "B" which erroneously left due to a scriveners' error. The second change is the language relating to the Special Magistrate which is being changed to City Hearing Officer so both the City Police and Code Enforcement can work together on this process. Staff recommends approval of the First Reading.

Mayor Gonzalez announced the Public Hearing with no response from the audience.

8.A Social Services Funding Awardee Update - Help Now of Osceola, Inc.

Help Now will provide an update to the Commission on the impact of City of Kissimmee funding on their services and ongoing agency needs.

Tammy Douglas, Executive Director of Help Now made a PowerPoint Presentation (Exhibit "A") and reviewed the information provided. She expressed her gratitude for the support of the City and City Commission.

Commissioner Martinez commented on a visit to the shelter and how impressed she is with the services that are provided.

8.B KUA Board of Directors Appointment

Consideration of Appointment to KUA Board of Directors due to an unforeseen vacancy.

City Manager Steigerwald reviewed the request from the Kissimmee Utility Authority (KUA) to appoint Ethel Urbina to fill the remaining term of the position vacated by Raymond Sanchez. The KUA Board of directors is currently in the process of interviewing candidates to fill Ms. Urbina's position and recommends this change.

Commissioner Castano made a motion to appoint Ethel Urbina to the vacancy left by Raymond Sanchez. Commissioner Eady seconded the motion.

8.C Advisory Board Vacancy - Planning Advisory Board

The Commission is requested to make an appointment to fill the vacancy on the Planning Advisory Board.

Commissioner Alvarez made a motion to appoint Alexander Alemi to the Planning Advisory Board as a Resident. Commissioner Eady seconded the motion.

Motion carried 5 - 0.

Commissioner Alvarez made a motion to appoint Manuel Gomez to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board. Commissioner Eady seconded the motion.

Motion carried 5 - 0. (This motion was later withdrawn)

City Manager Steigerwald asked the Commission to clarify the second appointment made by Commissioner Alvarez for the Parks and Recreation Board. City Clerk Hansell was asked for clarification and explained that Commissioner Alvarez does not currently have a board member vacancy for appointment.

Commissioner Alvarez made a motion to withdraw his original motion for the appointment of Manuel Gomez to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board. Commissioner Eady endorsed that motion and Commissioner Castano seconded the motion.

Motion carried 5 - 0.

8.D Annual Advisory Board vacancies with terms ending May 31, 2023

The Commission is requested to make appointments or reappointment for members to boards with terms ending on May 31, 2023.

After a brief discussion, City Attorney Sanchez de Fuentes informed the Commission that since all members would like to be reappointed, a joint vote could be made for the reappointments.

Commissioner Alvarez made a motion to reappoint Carlos Angarita (Board of Adjustment), Joseph Billittier, David Bracy, Kristen Camero (Citizen Police Review Board), Kimberly Murray, Adriana Serrano (Historic Preservation Board), Hannan M. Khan, Seewat "David" Anderson (Parks and Recreation Advisory Board), and Robert A. Bussiere (Planning Advisory Board). Commissioner Castano seconded the motion.

City Manager Mike Steigerwald reminded the Commission of the Groundbreaking Ceremony for "The Allen", which is the apartments in the first phase of the Beaumont Project. The ceremony will be held on Thursday, May 3, 2023 at 12:30 p.m. The Cuban Sandwich Festival is being held on Sunday, May 7, 2023, in Lakefront Park. And the final item is the Transportation Summit for roadway construction being hosted by Osceola County and the Florida Department of Transportation; the event will be held on Tuesday, May 9, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. at the Kissimmee Civic Center.

City Manager Steigerwald stated for the record that the City does offer programs for employees and they also get first chance to register for the camp programs.

Commissioner Martinez asked if the Commission could bring back the video project that allowed Commissioners to participate in informing the public of City projects, programs, and services. City Manager Steigerwald confirmed that it is possible with Commission consensus. Commission consensus was confirmed and City Manager Steigerwald will bring back a recommendation to the Commission on how to revive the program.

Commissioner Martinez requested the Commission meet in Workshop Session to discuss ways for the Commission to promote programs and services that are not sanctioned by the City. She stated we need to look at ways to get help for the citizens in the community.

Commissioner Martinez further continued and invited everyone to attend the free event being held at the Kissimmee Civic Center on May 6, 2023, from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. All non-profits have been invited to attend and provide information to the public.

Commissioner Martinez concluded her comments by announcing to the public that the City website is being updated and you can comment on the functions.

Mayor Gonzalez wished everyone a great night and a wonderful week.
